### JUNIORS — COLLEGE & CAREER PLANNING

College bound juniors are encouraged to continue the college search process. Juniors will meet with Mrs. Lamour and Mrs. Conrad on April 20, during enrichment to receive information regarding the college planning process. Students should also stop by the guidance office to gather information about schools offering programs of study that interest them. Families should begin making plans to visit colleges this spring and summer. Juniors are allowed 2 college visitation days this year (prior to April 30) and 2 college visitation days next year. If Juniors have not already taken the ACT exam, they should plan to test on June 12, 2010. The deadline to register for this ACT test is May 7, 2010.

### SENIORS

Seniors will meet with Mrs. Lamour and Mrs. Conrad on April 29 to pick up caps and gowns and finalize plans for graduation and post high school plans.

**College Bound Seniors** — College bound seniors should be finalizing their college plans. New scholarships continue to arrive in the guidance office; students are encouraged to explore these opportunities with Mrs. Lamour and Mrs. Conrad.

honor, but hosting a party where alcohol is available for teens is a big mistake. Underage drinking parties are a health and safety problem with serious legal ramifications.

#### Here are the facts:

- Parents who give alcohol to their teen's friends under any circumstances, even in their own homes, are breaking the law.

- Parents who knowingly allow a person 21 to remain in their home or on their property while consuming or possessing alcoholic beverages can be prosecuted and everything associated with such a violation can be confiscated, including personal property.

- Parents can be sued if they give alcohol to anyone under 21 and they in turn hurt someone, hurt themselves or damage property.

Parents can protect themselves and their teens by hosting safe, alcohol-free parties for youth during prom and graduation season. Refuse to supply alcohol to children in your home or on your property; be at home when your teenager has a party; make sure your teenager's friends do not bring alcohol into your home; talk to other parents about not providing alcohol at youth events; provide teenagers with opportunities for alcohol-free events and activities; provide non-alcoholic beverages; and report underage drinking.

All of us have the opportunity and responsibility to help Ohio's youth reach their full potential. As a parent, do your part to make this prom and graduation season safe for everybody.
