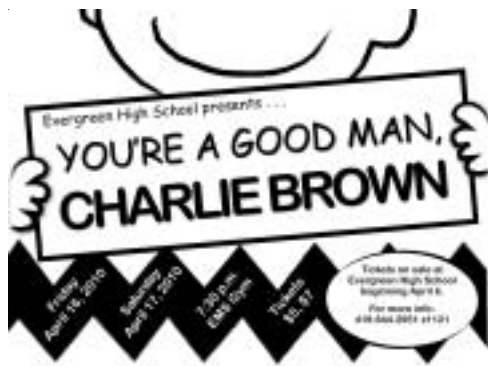


## Charlie Brown and "Peanuts" friends take Evergreen stage



Evergreen Drama Department will present *You're a Good Man, Charlie Brown* on Friday, April 16th and Saturday, April 17th at 7:30 p.m. in the Evergreen Middle School Gymnasium.

More than 50 students are involved in the production, on stage or backstage. The students started rehearsing at the end of February

and will continue rehearsing four to five nights per week until the show.

Seniors Nate Hess, Katelyn Fandrey and Tiffany Dowling return to the stage in this year's production. Nate played the mischievous Cat in the Hat in last year's production of *Seussical* and this year he portrays the down on his luck title character, Charlie Brown. Katelyn has gone from playing the shy and naive bird, Gertrude McFuzz to playing Charlie Brown's loud-mouth, know-it-all friend, Lucy Van Pelt. Tiffany has swapped animals this year. Last year, she played Mayzie La Bird and this year plays the lovable, one-of-a-kind dog, Snoopy.

Junior Katie Kerekes is also returning to Evergreen's stage as Charlie Brown's younger sister, Sally, after playing Jojo in *Seussical*. Ryan Damazyn, senior, and Wes Hollstein, junior, take on roles this year. Ryan plays the blanket-carrying, thumb-sucking and extremely knowledgeable Linus Van Pelt, and Wes plays the musical genius Schroeder.

*You're a Good Man, Charlie Brown* takes the audience through an average day for our characters – Charlie Brown's disappointing luck, Lucy's love for Schroeder, Sally's random thoughts, Linus's need for his blanket, Schroeder's respect for Beethoven, and Snoopy's enjoyment of mealtime.

Based on the "Peanuts" comic strip by Charles M. Schultz, the musical was originally created in 1967. Evergreen is performing the revised version which was on Broadway in 1999. It was also a TV movie in 1985, using the sketches and songs from the original musical.

## Evergreen Choirs Receive 'Superior', 'Good' Ratings

Evergreen Choral students competed at the OMEA District 1 Adjudicated Event on Friday, March 12th at Archbold High School.

The choir had two groups representing Evergreen this year – a Women's Chorus and Men's Chorus. The 65-member Women's Chorus received a 'I' rating (superior) for their performance. The 20-member Men's Chorus received a 'III' rating (good) for their performance.

"I am proud of both ensembles and the performances they gave," director Kristen Woodard said. "Both groups worked extremely hard in preparation for the event, growing as individual musicians and as ensemble members. They represented Evergreen very well."

This is the first year since Mrs. Woodard began teaching in 2004 that Evergreen has taken two choirs. In past years, the choir has competed as a full ensemble in Class C. This year, both choirs moved up a level, competing in Class B. The two choirs each prepared three pieces that they performed for three judges. One of the three pieces was chosen from a list of required repertoire. After performing the prepared pieces, the choirs moved onto the next phase of competition — sight reading.

In the sight-reading room, the choirs are given a piece of music that they have never seen before. They have four minutes to look over and discuss the music with the director. After this, the choir performs the piece with piano accompaniment. They then have one minute of instructional time with the director before the choir must perform the music unaccompanied, without any piano help. They choir is judged on both performances, being judged on their ability to look at the music and sing it without any singing assistance from the director.
